Dear Friends,

As I write the spring president's letter, I realize that this takes an effort of imagination since the wind chill factors are in the thirties! We at Friends, however, are nothing if not optimistic. I am sure the trees will bud, the robins will return, and temperatures will rise.

You may be wondering why the picture of a postage stamp accompanies this letter and why the picture of our state capital is smaller than the postage stamp. It is to highlight that the spending that the state provides public libraries on a per person per year basis is less than the cost of a single postage stamp!

The State Per Capita Library Aid program is a direct partnership between local libraries and the state; it is awarded to municipalities for library purposes.

Beginning with the FY11 state budget, funding was reduced to a level that is approximately 41 cents per person per year as the state's contribution to public libraries. Although the state budget has increased since FY 2011 and many programs which had suffered funding cuts have been restored, funding for libraries has remained at the decreased level. The New Jersey Library Association (NJLA) advocates that every library that meets minimum state library services requirements receive at least \$1.00 per capita under the state per capita aid program; i.e., the worth of about two-postage stamps!

In keeping with my optimism, I believe that communities can make a difference. If you agree with me that state support of our libraries is important, I encourage you to contact our state representatives to share your thoughts during the current budget negotiations. I urge you to thank Assembly representatives Mila Jasey and John McKeon for co-sponsoring A967, a bill that makes a \$3 million supplemental appropriation for increased Per Capita Library Aid and to ask State Senator Richard Cody to co-sponsor S234, the companion Senate bill. Meet Jessica Moskowitz

Jessica works as a Library Assistant at our Library. She is a student, working on her Masters of Library Science at Rutgers University, and a candidate for several scholarships. And, she is an active Friends volunteer!



As a Library Assistant, Jessica can frequently be found at the Help Desk or the Circulation Desk. In addition, she often supports the Children’s Department which she admits to being her first love. She staffs the Children’s Desk and assists with youth programs including cultural and craft activities. Jessica explains that she loves to dress up and never misses an opportunity to “role-play” in events including characters from the recent *Zombie Teens* and *Hunger Game* programs and Princess Leia from *Star Wars*, to name but a few of her personalities. More recently Jessica has also started to train on the Adult Reference Desk which she notes is great because it ties in so directly with her current curriculum.

Our Library can take some pride in knowing that it played a role in Jessica’s career development. After graduating with a degree in communications from William Paterson University, Jessica worked in Barnes & Noble’s Children’s Department. Her love for that area caused her to consider a career in library science, with a concentration in children’s librarianship. She spoke with professionals in several libraries including Assistant Director Amy Hyfler. That conversation must have been the charm because Jessica enrolled in Rutgers’ accredited online library school and is now working to complete her degree. That interview also led to Jessica applying for a position of Library Assistant. And Jessica just celebrated her one-year anniversary with our Library.

Our Library is very fortunate that she continues to work at Livingston. With her busy schedule she has had to drop her part-time work at the Mahwah and Ridgefield Park Libraries. But, then, Jessica notes that Livingston is “home” even though she recently moved to another town. Jessica explains that coming to the Library is magical—“even the doors open automatically like ‘Open Sesame’ revealed the hidden treasure in the cave of *Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves*.”

By this time, you will not be surprised to read that Jessica is ALWAYS positive and never says “no” to helping. She says, “By saying ‘yes’ to an opportunity or challenge, I can learn something new. And my co-workers are the best—always willing to help. It is a very nurturing environment. And it’s never boring.”

Programming

Despite some weather-related postponements, patrons were able to enjoy a variety of programs. The Stirling Duo & Friends returned for a second extraordinary program about Beethoven in February, following the Schubert program in January. The concert featured violinist Joseph Gluck (pictured left in a more informal shot), pianist Mark Yolleck, and cellist Szu Han Chuang-Tsay. Mr. Gluck has played with the St. Louis and Detroit Symphonies, as well as with the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra. Having retired from the NJSO, he now serves as concertmaster for the Summit Symphony. He also teaches privately and is the founder of the Stirling Duo. Mark Yolleck, the other half of the Duo, was Department Chair of Fine Arts in the South Orange/Maplewood School District. He is an accompanist and soloist who also teaches privately. Cellist Szu Han Chuang-Tsay is making her debut with the Stirling Duo. She is from Taiwan and, after coming to the United States, graduated from Julliard. Ms. Chuang-Tsay teaches both privately and at the Reverend Brown School in Sparta.



The audience was mesmerized on both occasions and expressed great interest in having more of the same. So stay tuned! As Program Specialist Thea White says, “All three musicians are extremely talented and Joe Gluck is a wonderful raconteur, amusing as well as informative. He shared just enough information to keep people interested but steered clear of turning the concert into a lecture!”

On Sunday April 19 at 3:00pm, the *Music Matters* series continues with the Masterwork Camerata. A part of the Masterwork Chorus, this choral group is based in Morristown. They will perform a delightful assortment of madrigals, folk song arrangements and spirituals as well as uplifting works by Vivaldi and Brahms.



Our adult programming department has many other projects under discussion so patrons can look forward to continued great programs.

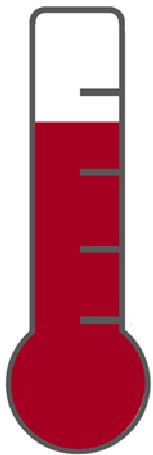

Friends is very excited by our “Take A Chance on the Library” Silent Auction. Our auction is open to all. Everyone is eligible to bid. And it is a “win-win” because bidders have the opportunity to garner some great items at low prices. Starting bids are, on average, less than 20% of estimated retail value, and some are as low as 10% or less. While great bargains are available, it is also a wonderful way to support our Library.

On or around April 1, you can find more detailed information about the merchandise offering (including any restrictions which may apply) by visiting the Auction Table outside the Library Program Room or by visiting our website (livingston.bccls.org; click on Take A Chance in Friends section).

Bidding will begin on April 1 and close on Thursday, April 30 at 11:30 AM. There will be 4 (four) ways to bid

1. Complete the paper bid form available at the Library (beginning April 1) and drop in the bid box on the Auction Table outside the Program Room at the Library. (You can also use the form on page 8.)
2. Submit online by going to livingston.bccls.org (click on Take A Chance in the Friends section and follow further directions for online bid submission)
3. Send an email to friends_livlibrary@verizon.net with all the required information in the body of your email including your full name, address, phone number, the item name or number you are bidding on, and the amount of your bid. Please indicate “Auction Bid” as the subject.
4. Call us at 973-992-4600 X505. Leave a detailed message on our voicemail with your name, phone number, address, the item you are bidding on, and the amount you wish to bid.

Bidding is in whole dollar amounts only. Multiple bids may be submitted for any item and the highest bid will be considered final. Patrons will receive a voucher for a free item from Friends’ Ongoing Book Sale for EVERY item a patron bids on (whether or not it is the winning bid); only one voucher per item.

Friends will post the current high bid each Wednesday throughout April (i.e., April 8, April 15, April 22, and April 29). Bids will be listed on site in the Library at the auction table, announced via a Library e-news announcement (you must be signed up with the Library’s e-news service), and posted on the website. If you have any questions you can also call us at 973-992-4600 X505.

Winners will be announced in the Program Room on April 30th beginning at noon. In the event of a tie among high bids, the winner will be chosen by lottery. Winners need not be present to win. Winners will be contacted via phone or email on April 30 and have until Monday, May 4 at noon to make arrangements for payment and receipt of item. After that time, the next highest bidder will be contacted.

The last time, she said apologetically, “Sorry I missed this week but I was working on scholarship applications.” She is also a valued member of our sorting team—making sure we have books in the correct categories so patrons can their selections more easily. And she staffs special events. Last, but certainly not least, Jessica handles Friends’ Facebook postings for which our social media-challenged Board is most grateful. Friends volunteering is actually Jessica’s second foray into library volunteering. While in high school she worked with the recently-retired George King, shelving books and assisting him in building up our Young Adult (YA) collection.
